Cameras Return to Campus Bringing Additional Security

Rosemead High School has reintroduced security cameras onto the campus once more. On behalf of a district-wide decision to refund this project, the devices were repaired and refurbished. The decision was in development for several years, but Dr. Bristol believes it is worth the wait. His hopes are to help keep stu-

dents and staff alike, safe on school grounds.

It was not clear of who initially brought up the idea, but it is confirmed that it has been in the workings for some time, and only recently did the district board reach a final verdict on the matter; resulting in the mass funding to fix up the cameras that have been inactive for nearly a decade.

Dr. Bristol sees the returning of the security cameras as a positive benefit to the school, especially regarding safety. The cameras provide an instant advantage on capturing incidents that occurred in campuses, such as conflict or smaller incidences, since tapes can be obtained easily and further actions can be taken quicker to resolve said events

This immediate change of how problems are handled allows for a more modest and refined reaction from both staff and students. "It's like having people watching over you 24/7," Dr. Bristol states, though currently, there is yet to be someone monitoring the cameras in real-time.

There are many speculations on whether the cameras fall under beneficial or invasive to personal privacy. However, Dr. Bristol believes that would not be a problem. The security cameras are scattered all throughout campus, strategically placed in the principal's opinion, where incidents are most likely to occur. Some are visible and some are not. No worries, there aren't any in the restrooms. He believes that "most students will see [the cameras] as beneficial, since most students wouldn't even notice them."

However, on the other subject matter on whether the cameras are invasive, he is more than accepting to have a talk with those who express an issue with this new implementation. "If they have a complaint, they are more than happy to talk to us. But our main job is to protect the students and the property and the school."

Class Discussion Grade Leads to Unjust Stress

Many teachers who are unable to grasp the attention of their students base a portion of their grades on student participation, which does not accurately judge a student based on how much they know or how often they pay attention during class.

Many students are conflicted over the idea of being graded by how often they participate during class time. As an individual learner at school, many people understand the struggle to raise their voice with the thought that there would be an audience of people staring at the speaker.

Many students may repeat the question, "What?" several times just to hint that a student is incorrect or inaccurate in their answer.

This a noticeable act of humiliation towards the speaker. Knowing that they are being judged on how often or how well they respond to questions asked in class causes great stress towards students as well, and they may feel discouraged that there are other students who may have a better answer than

them.

Class participation is common in students' grades, but highly unfavorable by students who have to face such policies.

It criticizes the amount of knowledge a student has, the rate the student takes to answer questions, and how talkative or quiet they are. Listening is unknown as it cannot be seen unless the student shows body language such as nodding their head.

Participation could greatly affect a student's final grade, but in truth, it does not determine all the knowledge a student has. Students may want to answer the question being asked, but they may not be called on.

They may not function the information as fast as others, and it is often very pressuring to try to come up with an accurate answer in the amount of time they are given. Class participation would then feel like a competition about who knows more and who gets called on first, which does not seem to be the true purpose of students' involve-

ment in class.

There should be other alternatives towards grading students. If a student were able to write their answers down, they may be able to communicate and express more of their knowledge rather than struggling to quickly state an answer.

Pressure also makes students forget what they are trying to say which can be very frustrating when deep inside they have something to express about the topic.

It seems that if a student were to be judged on their participation, they would also be judged upon their character and how much knowledge they have. This would be unfair for all the students, collectively, because nobody learns the same way or at the same rate.

Participation should not be a competition about who knows more or how active a student is in class because there are people who choose to listen more often than to speak. Instead, students should be voluntarily wanting to speak and share their knowledge based on the subject as they please.
